# 6. Course Description:

A) Objectives:

This course aims to understand religion as a phenomenon and the human condition that coincides with it. The student is expected to explore and gain familiarity with several concepts in religion. Concepts and terms that have been heard of in one's lived experience would be given philosophical attention in light of the debates and discussions on it in extant philosophical literature. Thereafter the student is expected to choose a concept in religion for a detailed study. As with any philosophy course, the student has to be prepared for debating difficult and even contentious ideas without being disagreeable.
