☐ Transformation of Sentences: Direct and Indirect Narration

Direct and Indirect Narration

Direct Narration: The reported speech repeats exact words of the speaker.

Indirect Narration: The reported speech supplies the content of statements of the speaker.

While converting the direct narration into indirect narration, tenses change as follows.

Reporting Verb	Reported Speech		
Present/Future Tense	Verb tenses do not change.		
Past Tense	Present* → Corresponding past	Past Simple → Past Perfect (Often)	Past Continuous → Past Perfect Continuous
	will → would		

^{*} If the reported speech relates to any universal fact, then the present simple in the reported speech remains the same.

☐ Paragraph Structure and Vocabulary Building

- **An update on the history of EPP.**
- Paragraph: An expression of a theme
 - > Strategies of paragraph structuring
 - Size: The paragraph size should be revised if it looks inappropriate.
 - Details: First, suggestion of the theme; next, elaboration; and finally, conclusion.

The pattern should emerge on its own, naturally.

• Conversation: It is subject to the writer's style.

A successful assignment of **theme titles** to each paragraph ensures a consistent organisation of paragraphs.
